The children have arrived back in school refreshed and looking much taller and have begun the new school year with such enthusiasm and vigour. The atmosphere in school is purposeful and focussed and the children are working extremely hard.

On Tuesday night we had our welcome parents meeting and I hope that everyone who attended enjoyed learning about your child's curriculum as well as general class routines and year group expectations. In Mrs Kemble's welcome speech she emphasised your role as parents as your child's primary educators and that we welcome and actively encourage participation in your child's learning so we can create a partnership that we will ensure the best outcomes for your child. We try to ensure that we offer a range of learning experiences so each child develops and blossoms at their own pace and their individual talents are nurtured.

Faith Life



We have had our first school Mass of the year. This was well attended by the parishioners of St. John parish and they enjoyed refreshments after mass provided by the school PTA. I appreciate that parents are extremely busy and many of you work, but it would be nice to see those of you who can come at mass to offer your support to the school community through pray and participation and to get to know some of the parishioners. This will build the whole school and parish community so we can offer mutual support. Father Brett's gave a rallying sermon and he encouraged the children to be beacons of their faith by being loving and considerate. The next school mass will be held on 10th October 9.30am and will be a celebration of God's harvest.



The year 5 children joined all the other school in the East Anglian Diocese for a celebratory Mass with Bishop Alan Hope. It was a moving service, the music was beautiful and there were approximately 700 children and accompanying staff. Our children behaved impeccably during the service and then enjoyed a lunch provided by the cathedral. It was so affirming to know that we are part of a larger community of schools and that we can all come together to celebrate our faith. At the end of the service all the school were presented with a special plaque to proudly display in their schools. A special thank you to Mr Bracher one of our school governors who kindly accepted to accompany us on the trip.



We have launched the Mini Vinnie's group in school. There was a great deal of interest from the children; especially the younger ones, but we now have 26 children across the school who would like to commit to becoming a Mini Vinnie. The parents of the children who have requested to join will be receiving an information sheet about the organisation; and a permission slip that needs to be signed and returned to school before the children are enrolled. Once enrolled the children will receive a badge and certificate which will be presented during Monday assembly next week.

The children have to be 7+ and commit to attending one meeting a week held on Monday lunch time at 12.30. The children will have early lunch passes to ensure they have plenty of time to eat their lunch.



We would like to continue our support for the storehouse food bank to ensure that people in our immediate community are not going hungry. To do this the **House Captains will be collecting store cupboard food during registration time daily until the 10th October, which is the day of our harvest mass.**

They will then pack up the food and it will be collected by the food bank ready for distribution. Last year we collected a whole trolley full of food, so this year we hope that we can match or exceed this.



This year Cafod family fast day is on **6th October** and their theme is wear something bright for El Salvador. The fundraising will contribute to the purchasing of seeds and equipment so that communities can become sustainable. The children are really eager to be involved but we are conscious that the day coincides with the already planned harvest house collections. **So we have decided to go ahead and the children can come into school in bright clothes and bring in a small donation of your discretion. Every little helps!**

At the beginning of each academic year the children vote to elect their representatives for the school council. The council meets between 3 and 4 times a term and the agenda for each meeting is created by the children through their request boxes. These meetings have minutes that are sent to each class and the representatives' feedback. The meetings give the children a voice and provide an idea opportunity for them to be involved in making decisions and influencing what goes on in school.

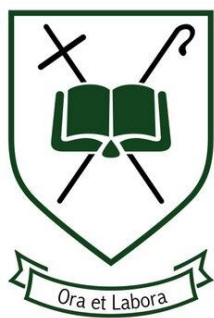
The first school council meeting will be held on Thursday 28th September at 12.30 pm
